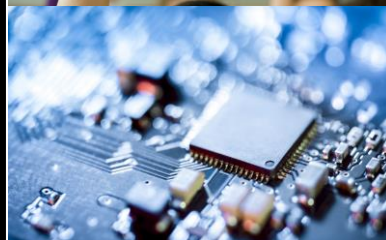

Introduction

The data contained in this publication is prepared to assist in the planning and development of educational and training programs to meet future employment needs and as an aid in the guidance of making career choices. Projections are created using guidance, methodology, and software provided by the Projections Managing Partnership (PMP) in cooperation with the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Data Sources

Industry Employment Projections Created from using Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW), Current Employment Statistics (CES) and U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (VEA) data and an analysis of macroeconomic variables for the state and its regions, including, but not limited to population by age group, gross domestic product (GDP), personal income, per capita income, revenue, and housing starts.

Occupational Staffing Patterns Provided by the Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics (OEWS) survey results for the state and local areas. Occupational data reported by employers throughout Alabama is summarized by NAICS codes to establish an industry's employment by occupation.

National Employment Factors and projections provided by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Assumptions

Rather than forecasting actual outcomes, these projections are created by focusing on the long-term cycles, or underlying trends, of occupations. Because of the limitations inherent in any set of occupational projections, it is important to emphasize that the figures in the tables be viewed more as indicators of relative magnitude and probable direction than as exact estimates of occupational demand.

The following assumptions were made in creating projections for the state of Alabama and its workforce development regions:

- Broad demographic, technological, scientific, and social (i.e., values placed on work, education, income, and leisure) trends will continue

- Major events, such as new major armed conflicts will not develop and no major natural disasters, including pandemics, will significantly alter long-term occupational trends

- Existing laws and policies with significant impacts on economic trends are assumed to hold throughout the projection period

This publication, based on the total employment concept, includes wage and salary employment, self-employed, unpaid family members of a family business, agricultural workers, and those employed in private households as domestic workers.

Highlights

Alabama's total employment is projected to grow from 2,119,950 to 2,254,040 over the 2020-2030 projection period. The projection period's annual growth rate of 0.62%, higher than the previous cycle's (2018-2028) annual growth rate of 0.48%. Most annual openings are projected to be from transfers and exits, 93,425 and 145,745, respectively. Around 13,000 openings are projected as a result from growth. The total number of projected workers by major occupational group:

773,450 in various professional occupations

560,990 in service and sales occupations

251,260 in office and administrative support occupations

103,960 in construction and extraction occupations

30,810 in farming, fishing, and forestry occupations

533,570 in installation and maintenance, production, and transportation occupations

Alabama's leisure and hospitality sector is projected to have the fastest growth over the period at 11.96%, likely due to pandemic recovery. The health care and social assistance industry contributes the highest number of new jobs at 29,560. Of the major occupational groups, healthcare support occupations are projected to growing the fastest over the projection period at 14.54%. Largely contributing to this growth are home health and personal care aids, medical assistants, and nursing assistants with growth of 4,210, 1,850, and 1,600, respectively. Computer and mathematical and food preparation and serving-related occupational groups are the second and third fast growing groups at 11.14% and 11.06% respectively.

The occupations with the highest number of openings due to growth include cooks, restaurant (520), fast food and counter workers (435), home health and personal care aides (420), registered nurses (415), laborers and freight, stock, and material movers, hand (360), industrial machinery mechanics (345) and miscellaneous assemblers in fabricators (345). Growth for occupations falling into the food preparation and serving-related and the healthcare practitioners, technical, and support occupational groups largely result from pandemic recovery and loosening of pandemic restrictions. Due to the growing manufacturing industry in Alabama, production occupations continue to follow an upward trend in growth.

Occupations requiring a high school diploma, or equivalent, or no formal education credential account for 65% of projected occupations over the 2020-2030 period. Many of these occupations require no prior work experience or short-term on-the-job training for entry.

Office and administrative support occupations continue to decrease with the lowest percent (-3.09) and net (-8,020) changes. Advances in technology and virtual outsourcing continue to allow reduction in support staff, including word processors and typists (-35.12%), switchboard operators, including answering services (-22.51%), secretaries and administrative assistants, except legal, medical, and executive (-4,337), and tellers (-967).

Regional Highlights

Region 1 shows the fastest growth over the projection period at 7.27%, along with the highest annual total openings. Production, transportation and material moving, healthcare practitioners and technical, and computer and mathematical occupational groups are the largest contributors to this growth, netting approximately 16,700 new jobs.

Region 5 follows closely as the second fastest growing at 7.22%. With the announcement of Amazon being a major contributor, transportation and material moving occupations have the highest net change adding 2,930 jobs.

Region 7 is the third fastest growing at 7.18% with a net change of 22,700. The top three occupational groups with the highest net change include: food preparation and serving-related occupations (6,040), healthcare practitioners and technical occupations (2,270), and transportation and material moving occupations (2,220).

Region 2's occupations contributing most to growth include miscellaneous assemblers and fabricators (350), industrial machinery mechanics (230), home health and personal care aides (230), stockers and order fillers (230), and heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers (200).

Within region 3, retail sales workers, food and beverage serving workers, material moving workers, and assemblers and fabricators show the highest total openings totaling 38,005

Region 4 is projected to see a net gain of 29,870 new jobs over the projection period. The occupations with the highest net growth include registered nurses (1,380), cooks, restaurant (1,230), home health and personal care aides (1,170), heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers (870), and fast food and counter workers (840).

While most regions show negative growth for farming, fishing, and forestry occupations, region 6 is projected to show growth at 0.44%.

User's Guide

What measures are the best indicators of occupational job demand?

1. Total annual job openings indicate the magnitude of the expected labor demand, while the percent change in employment shows the direction in which the employment level for the occupation is rising, shrinking, or remaining at the current level.
2. Employment change expressed as a percent.

What generates job openings?

1. Growth
2. Exits – workers leaving the workforce entirely
3. Transfers – workers leaving an occupation and transferring to another

What causes employment growth?

For most occupations, industrial growth has the single greatest influence on the growth in the occupation's employment. Industrial growth occurs when the demand for goods or services rises and, in turn, the demand for workers to produce those goods or services also rises. Technological change can raise the demand for some skills while eliminating the need for others. While this shift is taking place, demand in the industry may be increasing or decreasing. New ways of doing business, such as self-service, out-sourcing, 24-hour operations or employee leasing can alter the demand for labor.

Do workers tend to leave some occupations more than others?

Every occupation has a different separation rate. More desirable occupations as well as those which require extensive education or training tend to have lower separation rates.

What factors determine the number of job openings for an occupation?

1. The occupation's growth – negative or positive
2. The occupation's transfer/exit rate

Which factor is most important?

The number of people employed in the occupation and the separation rate tend to be more important determinants of the number of job openings than the occupation's growth rate.

What is the best way to compare one occupation with another?

Examine the total average annual job openings, and openings due to growth. Many job openings increase the chances of finding a job in the occupation. Also, examine the percent change in employment. A high percent increase in employment in an occupation that employs relatively few workers indicates entry into the occupation may be difficult, however, opportunities for advancement may be excellent.

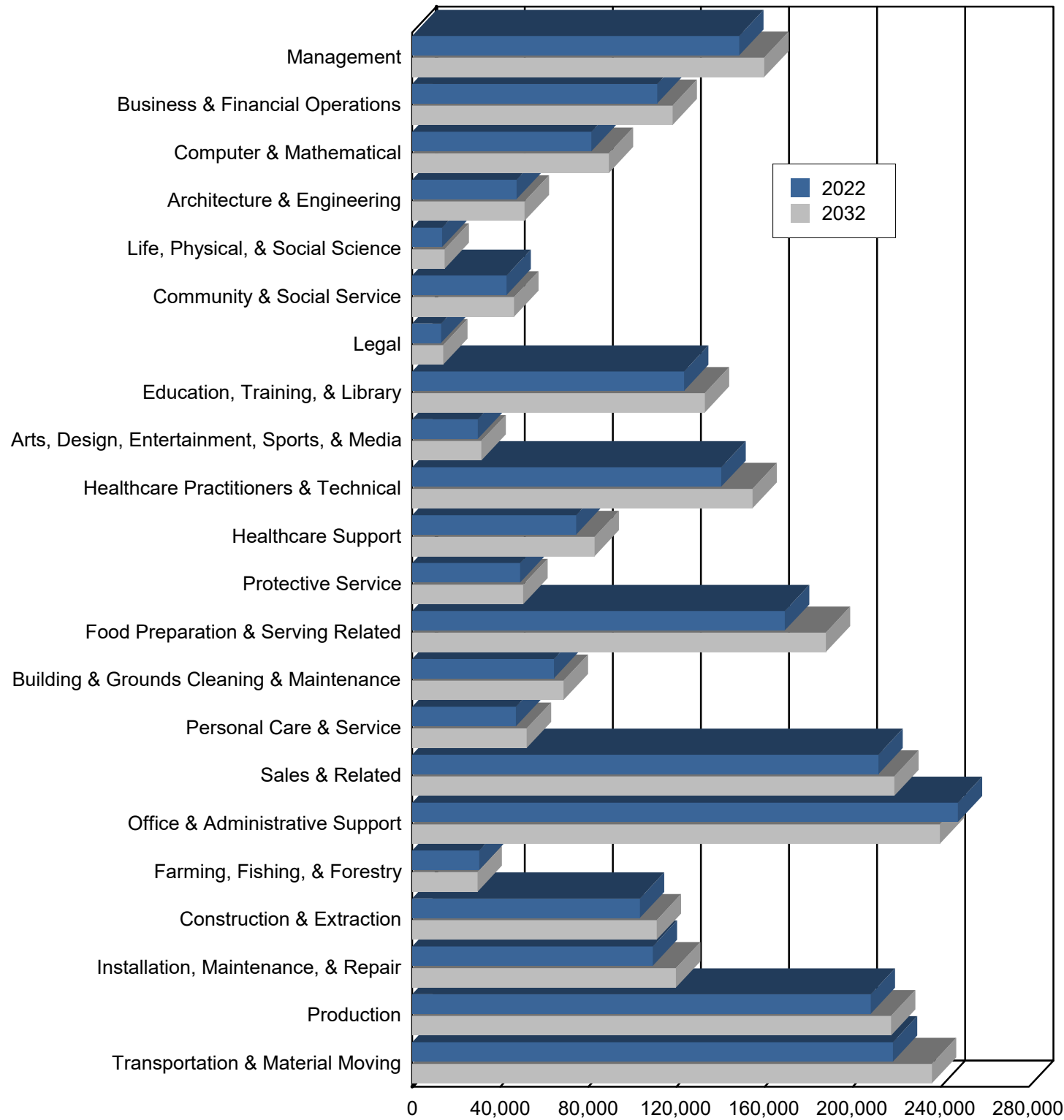

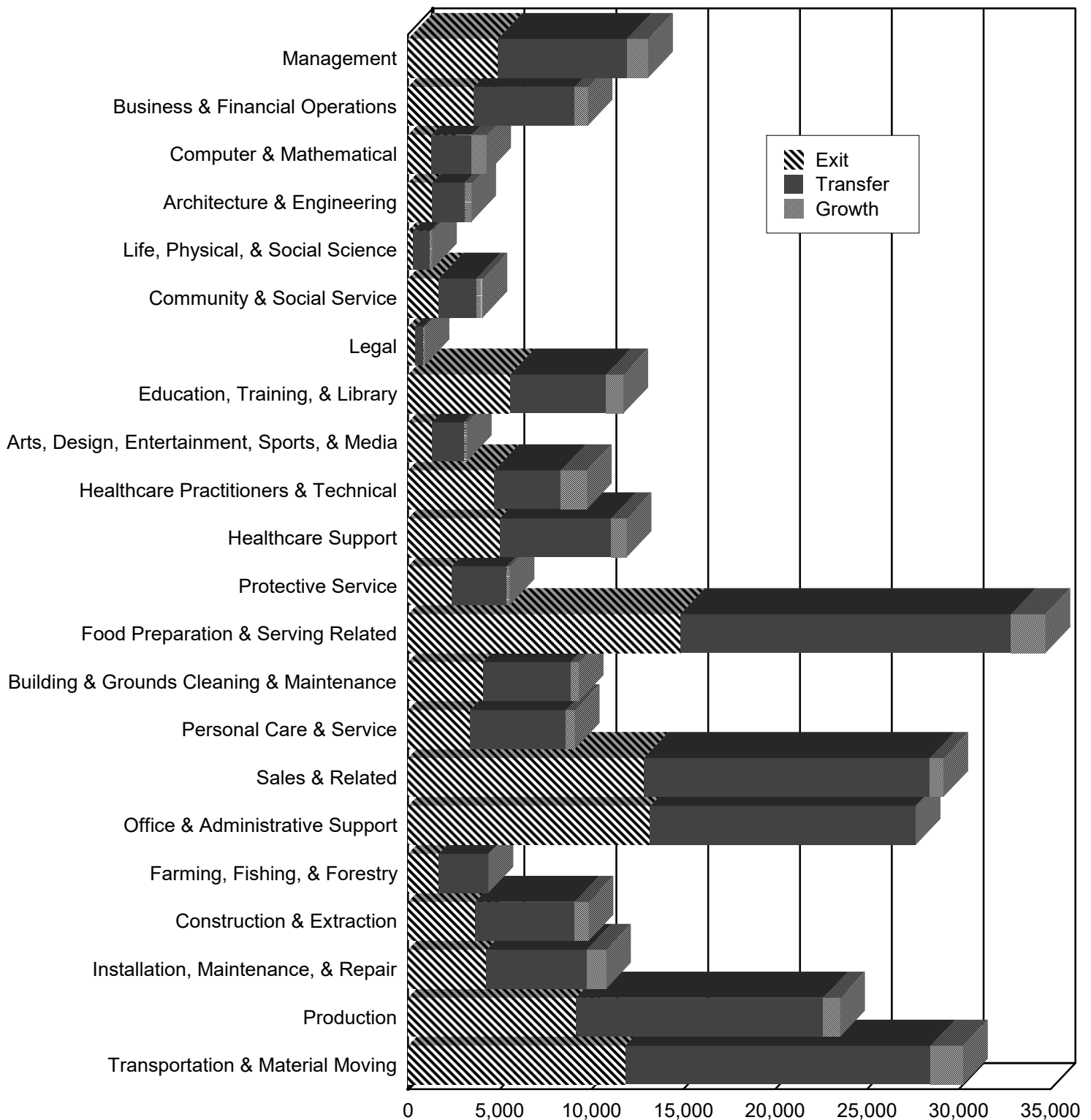

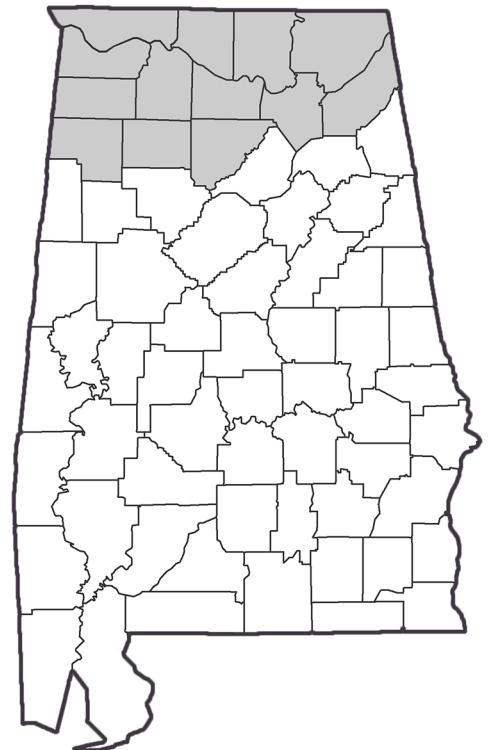

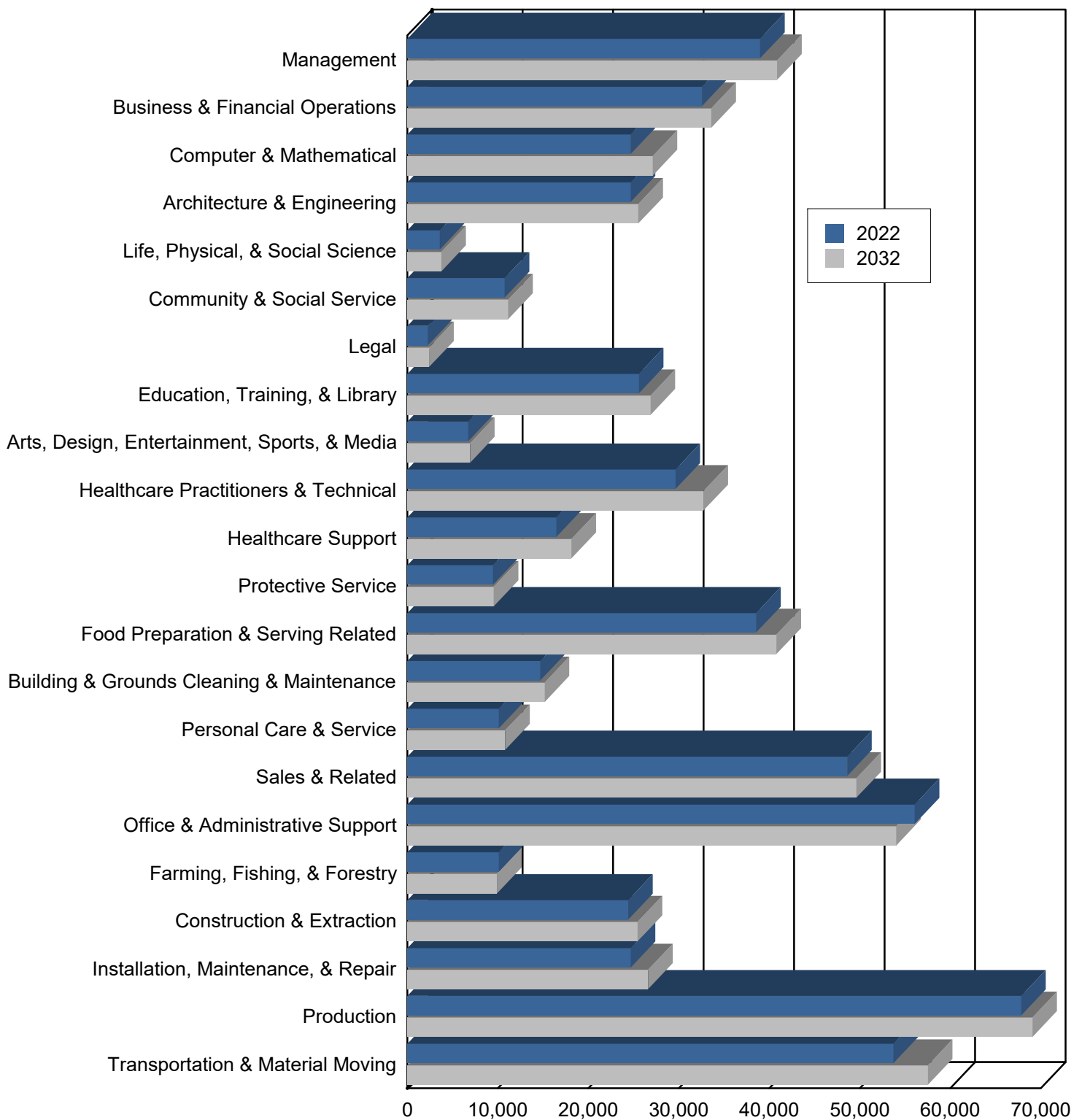

Region 1 Occupational Projections 2022-2032 by Major Occupational Group

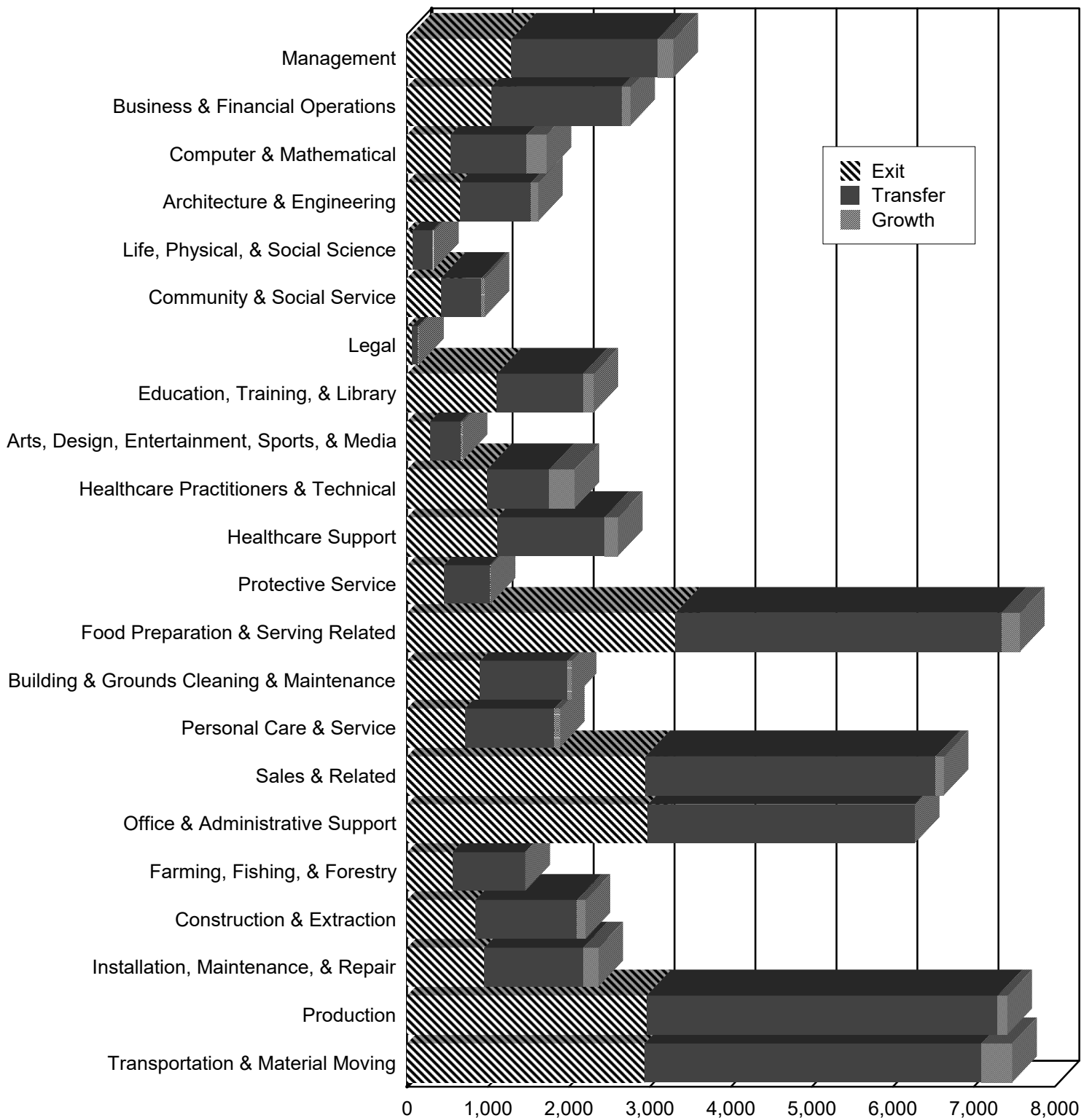

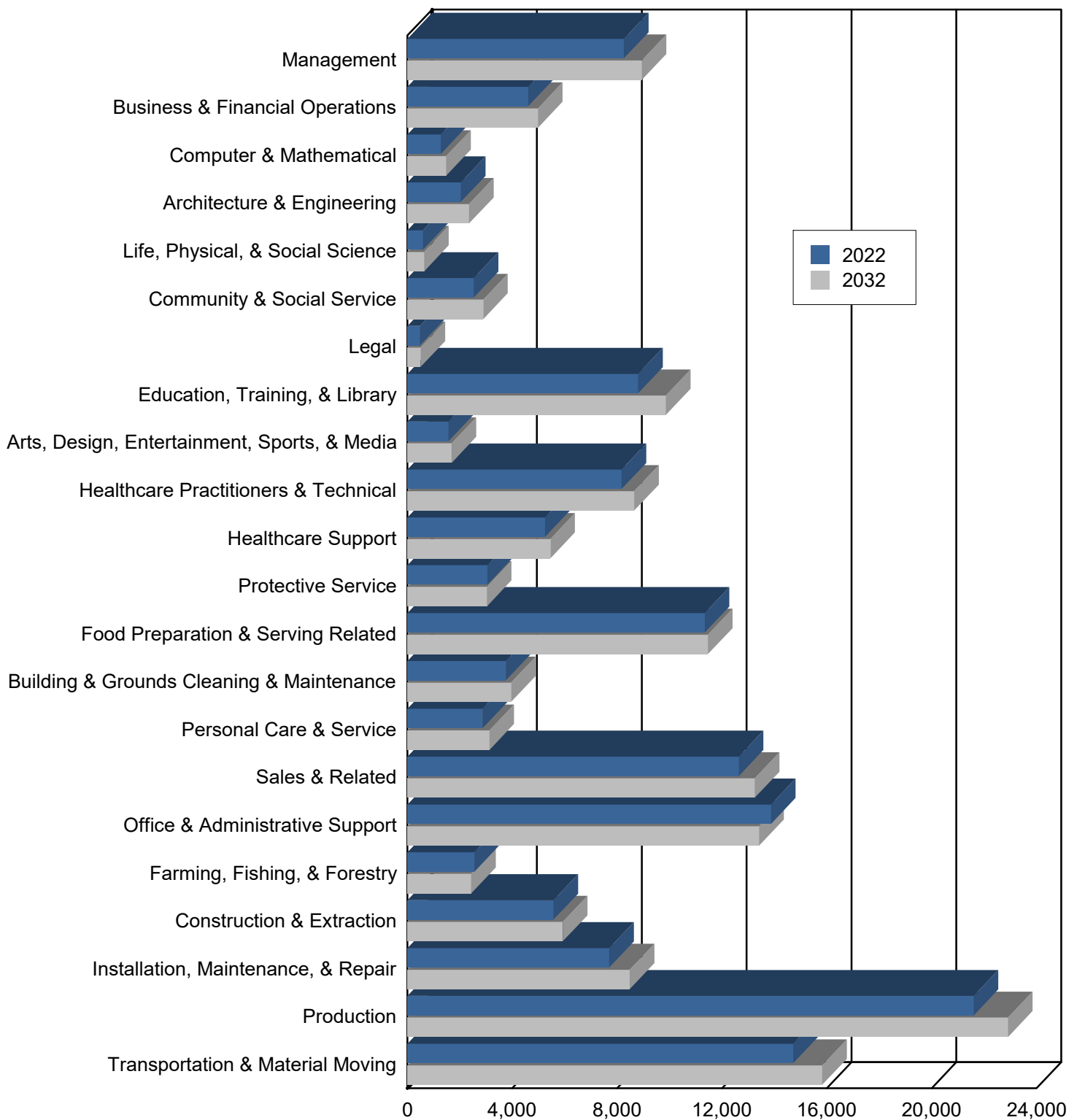

Region 2 Occupational Projections 2022-2032 by Major Occupational Group

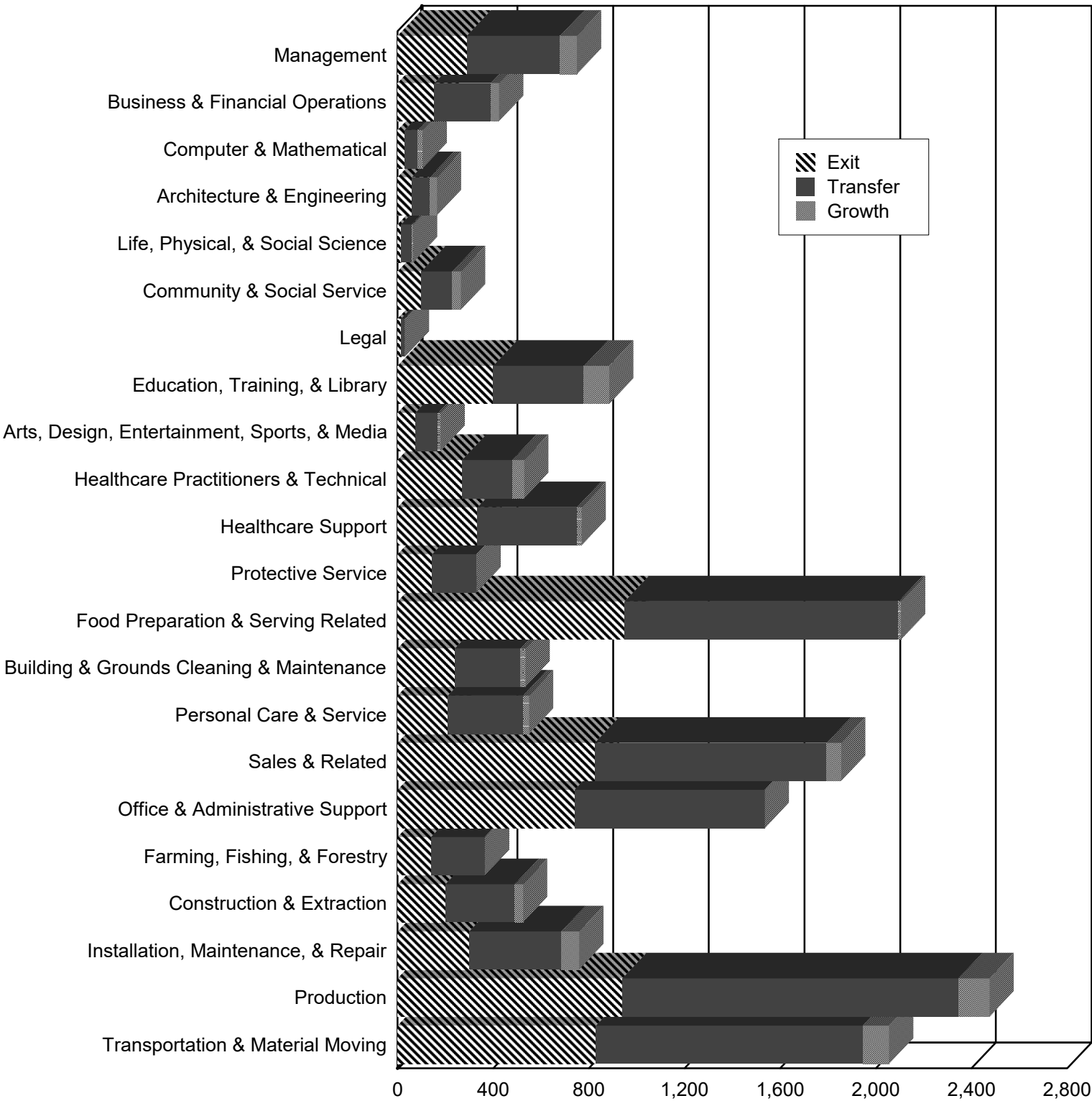

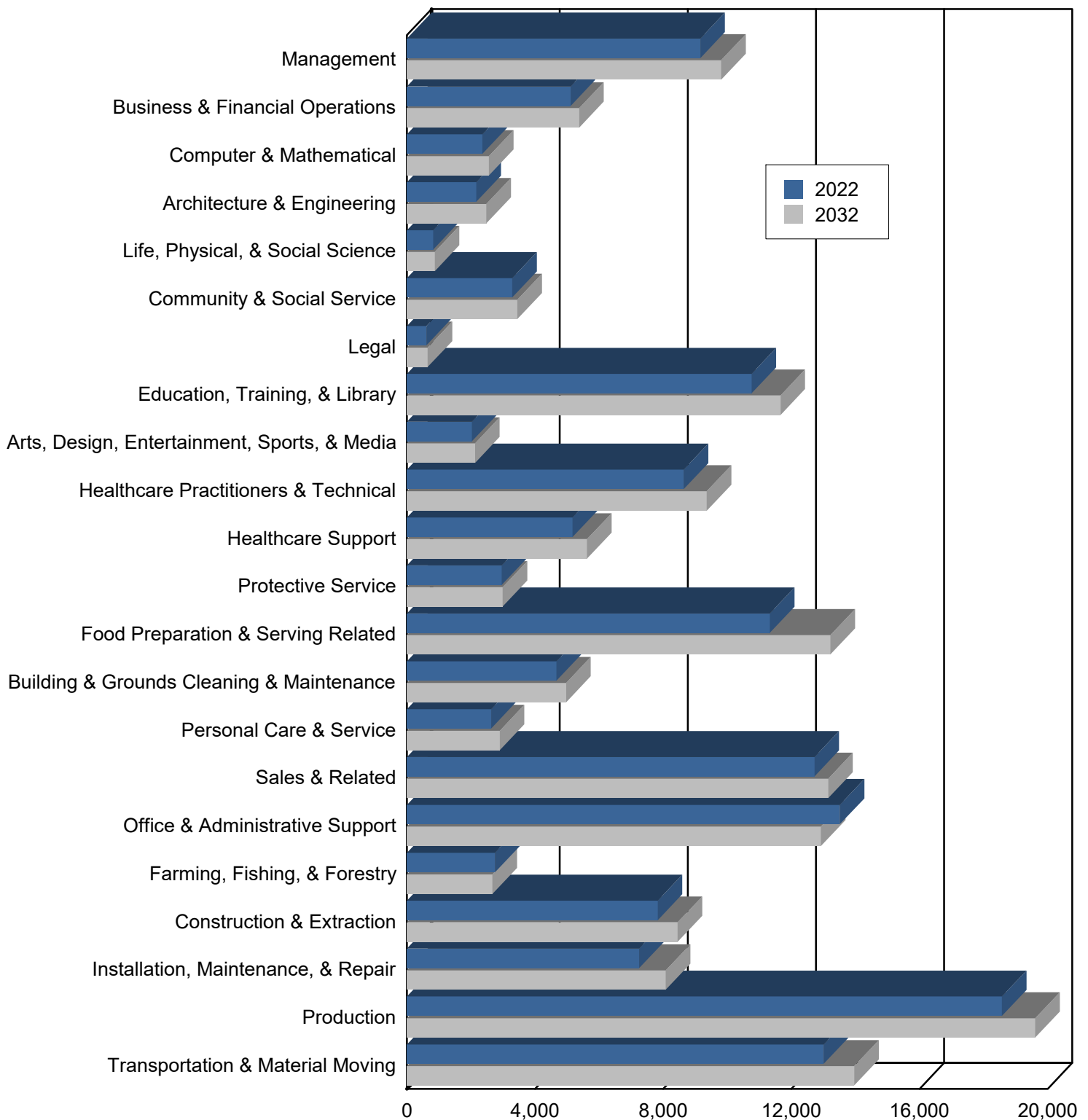

Region 3 Occupational Projections 2022-2032 by Major Occupational Group

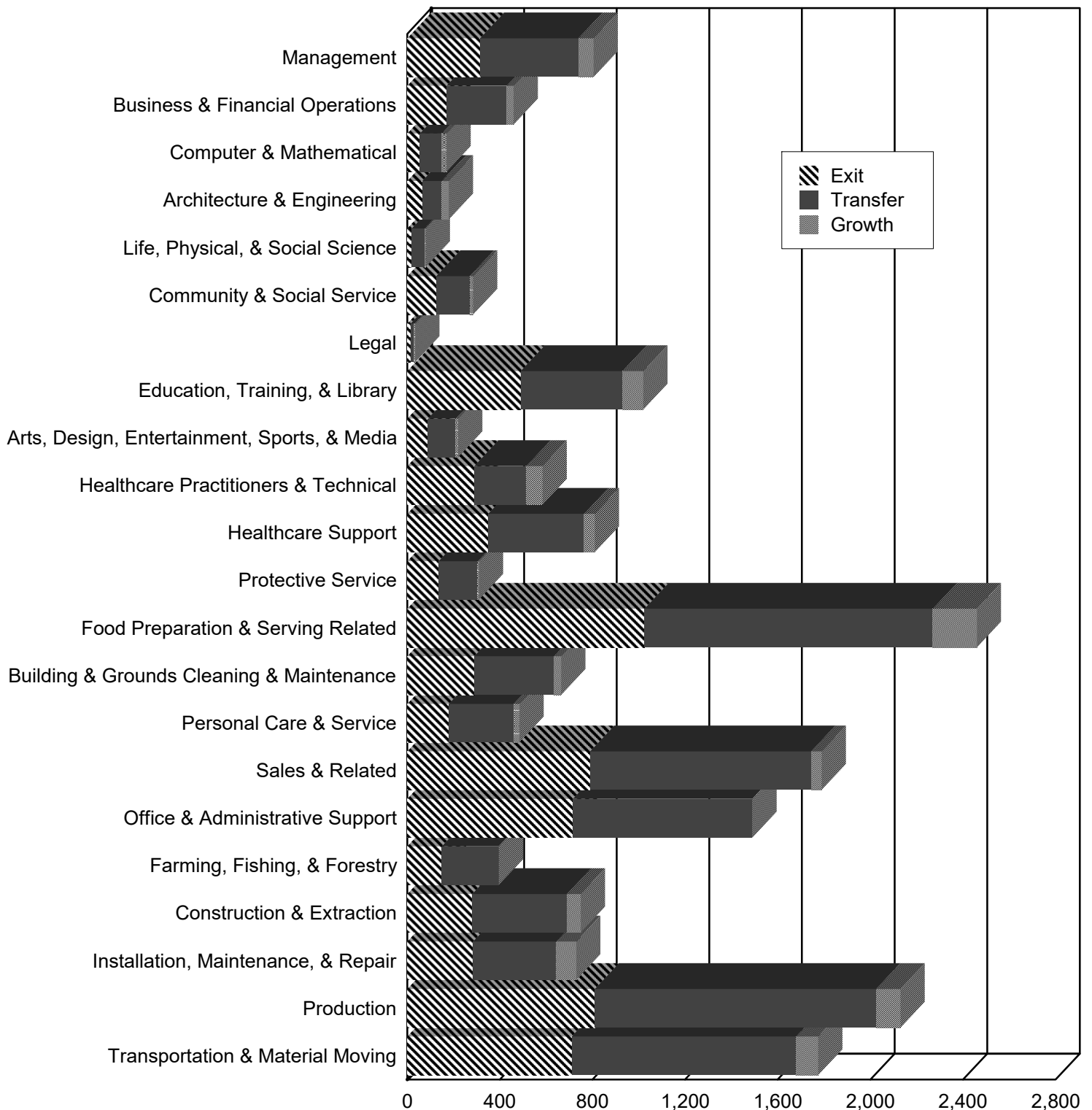

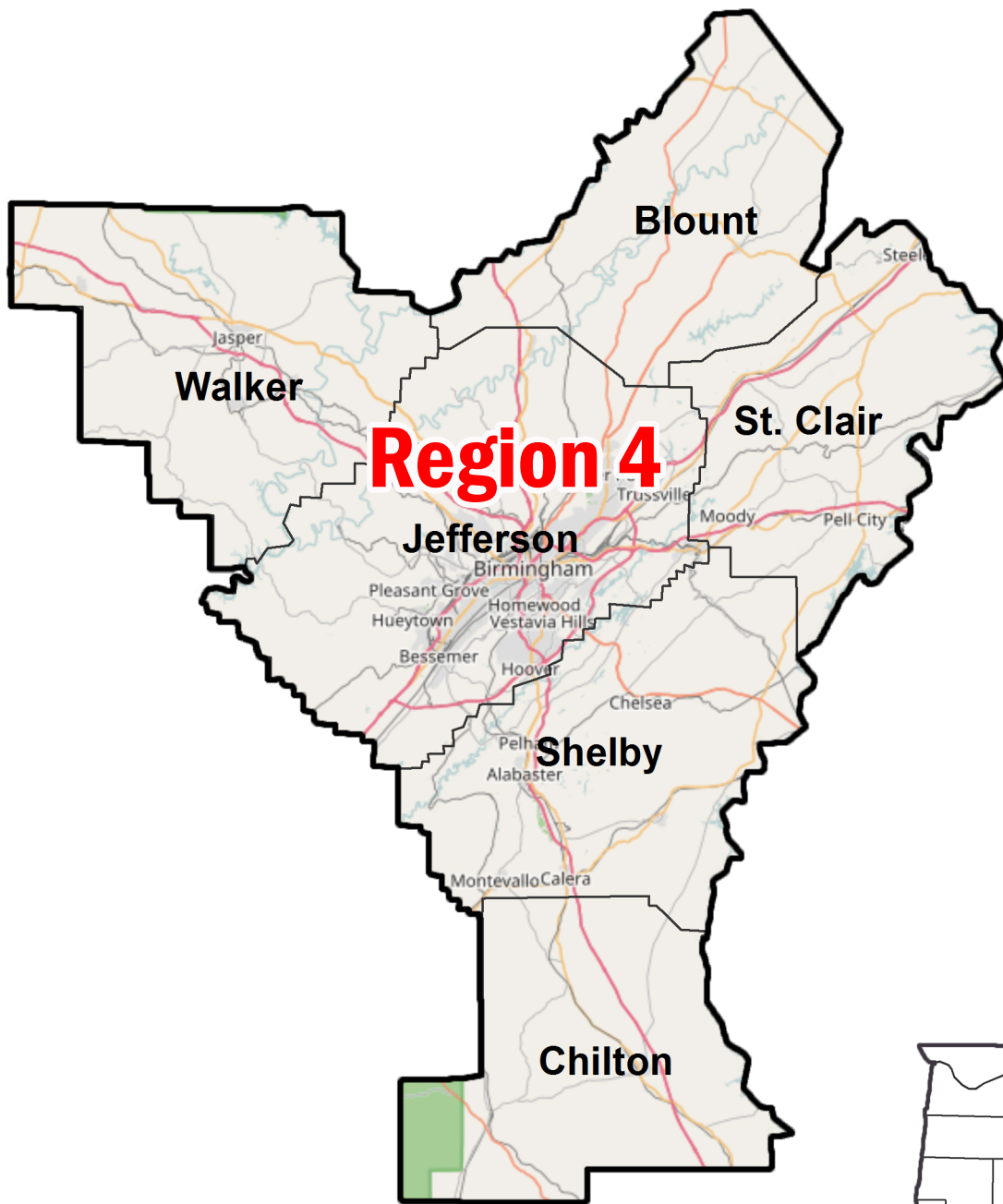

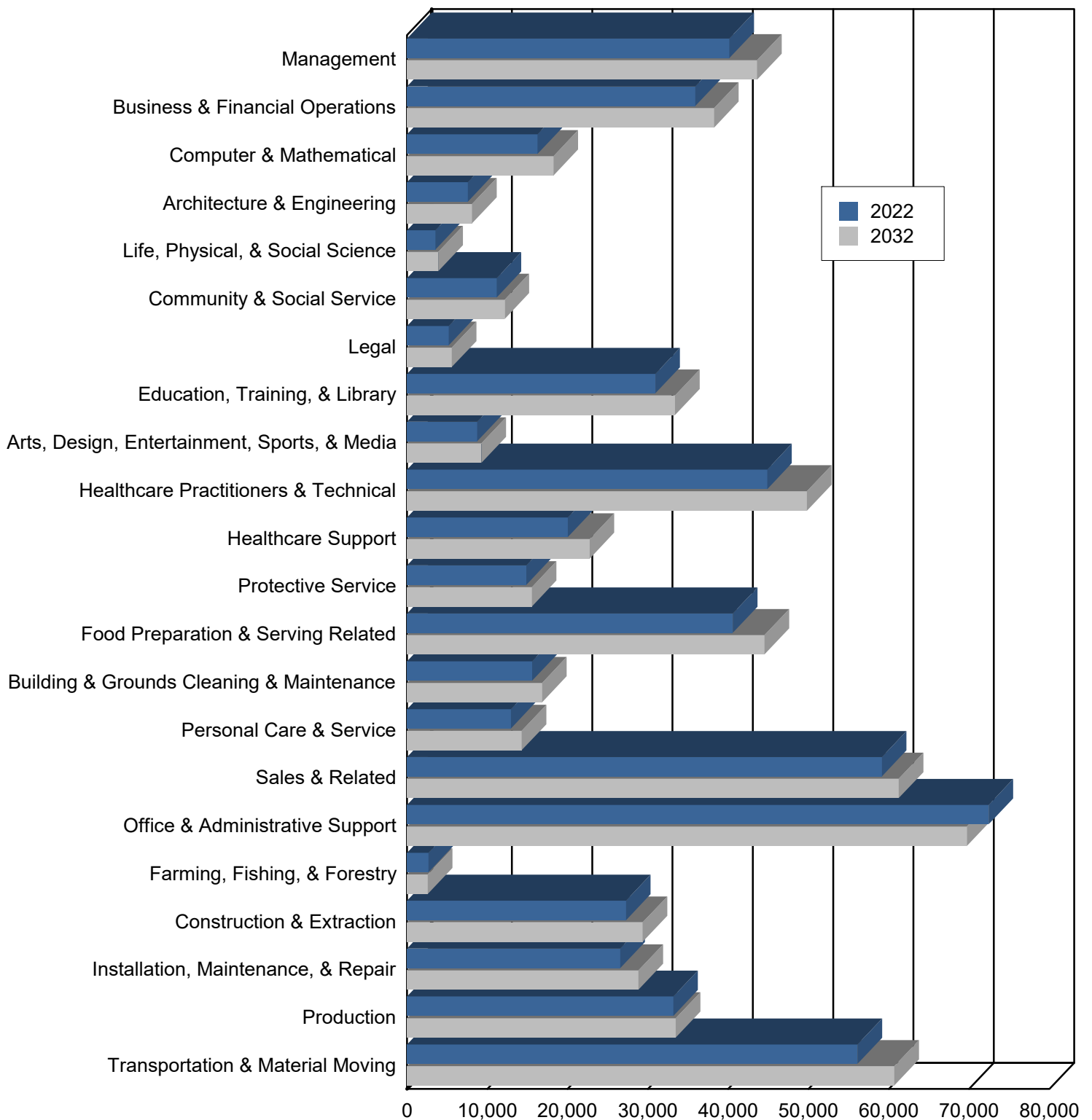

Region 4 Occupational Projections 2022-2032 by Major Occupational Group

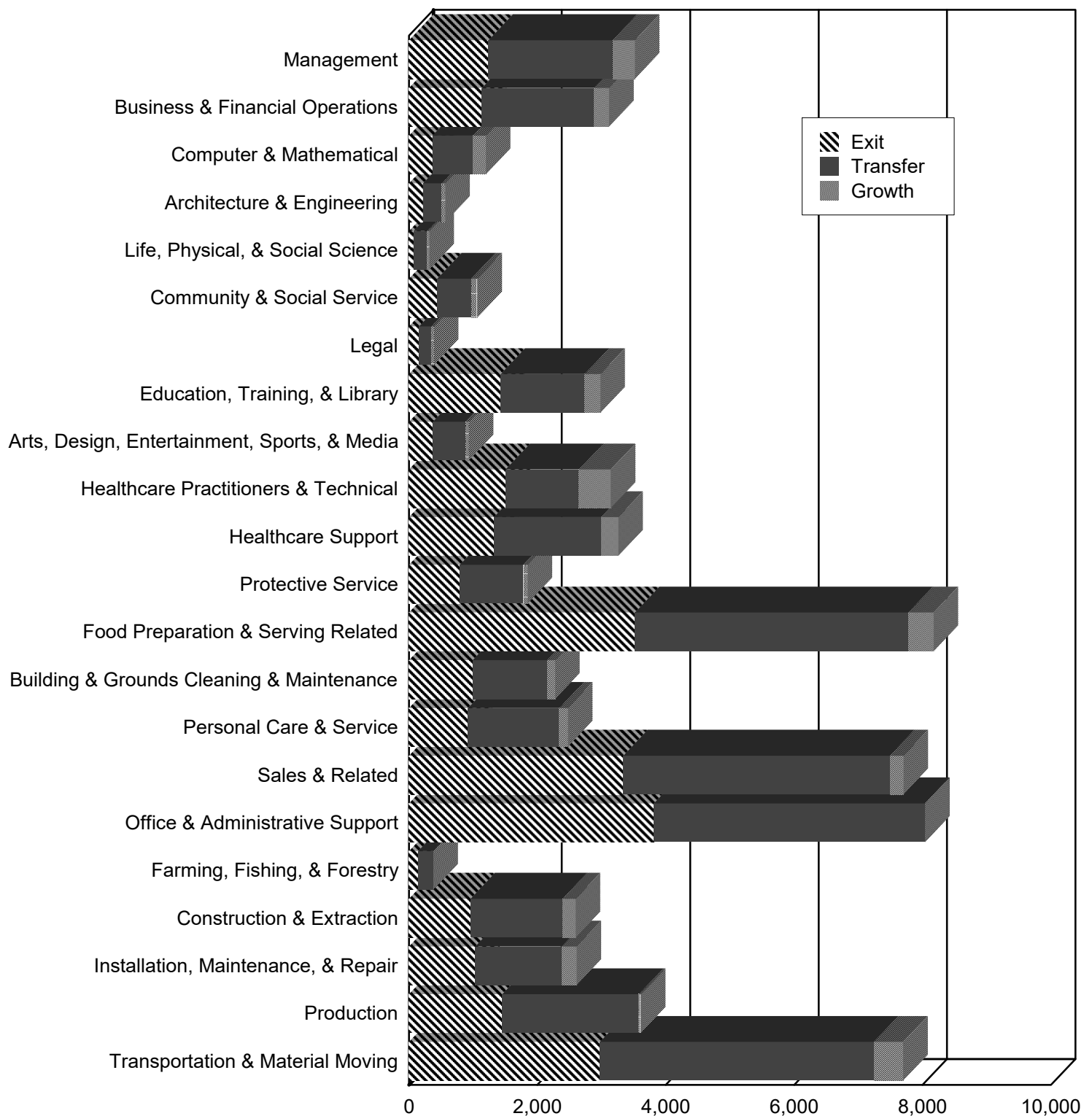

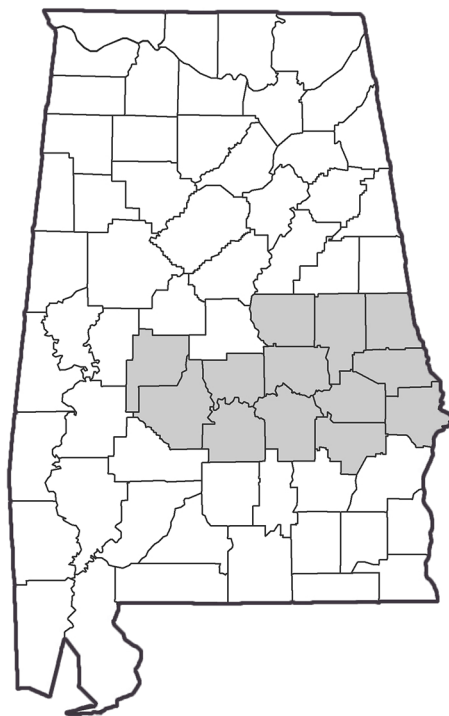

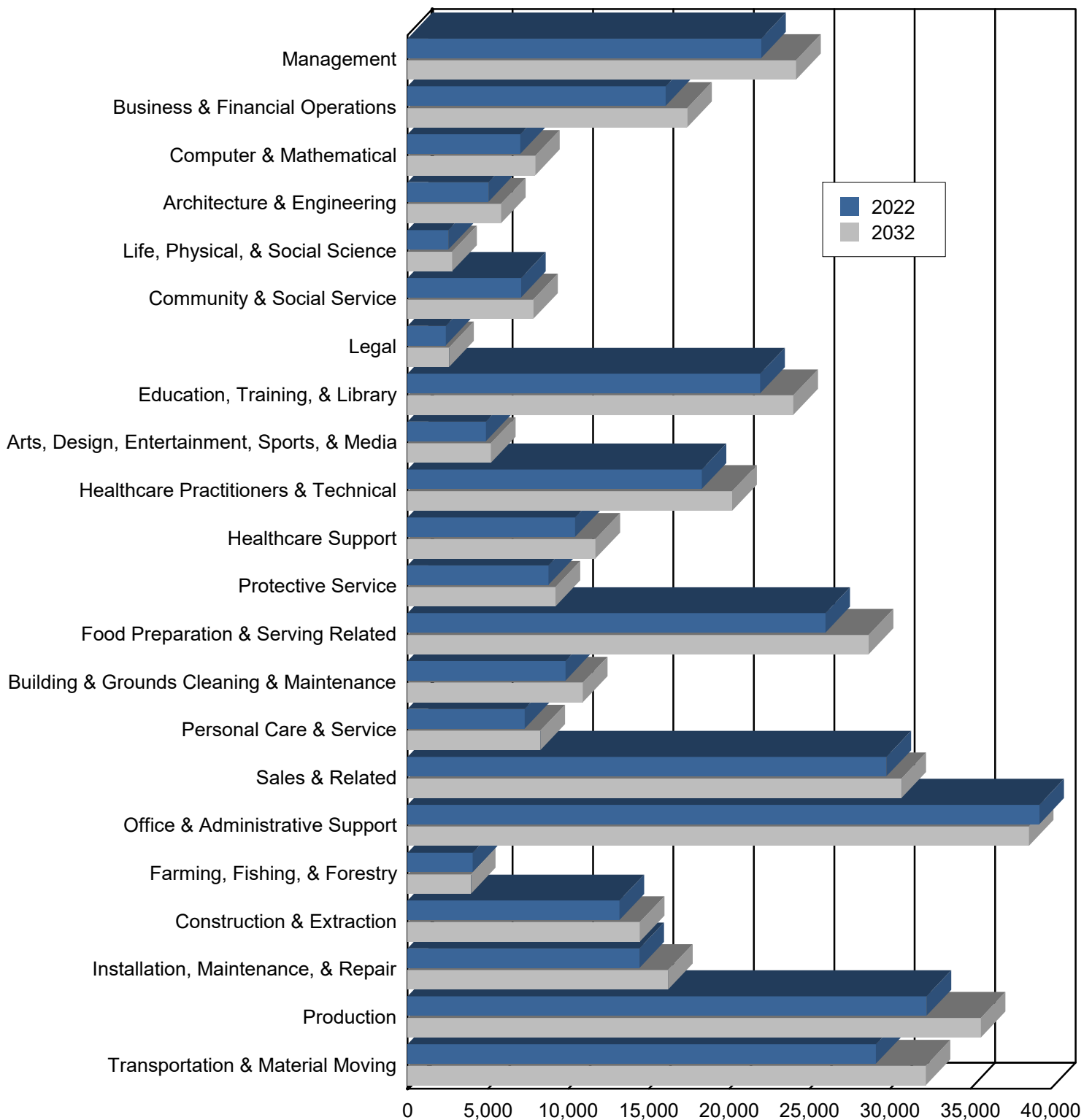

Region 5 Occupational Projections 2022-2032 by Major Occupational Group

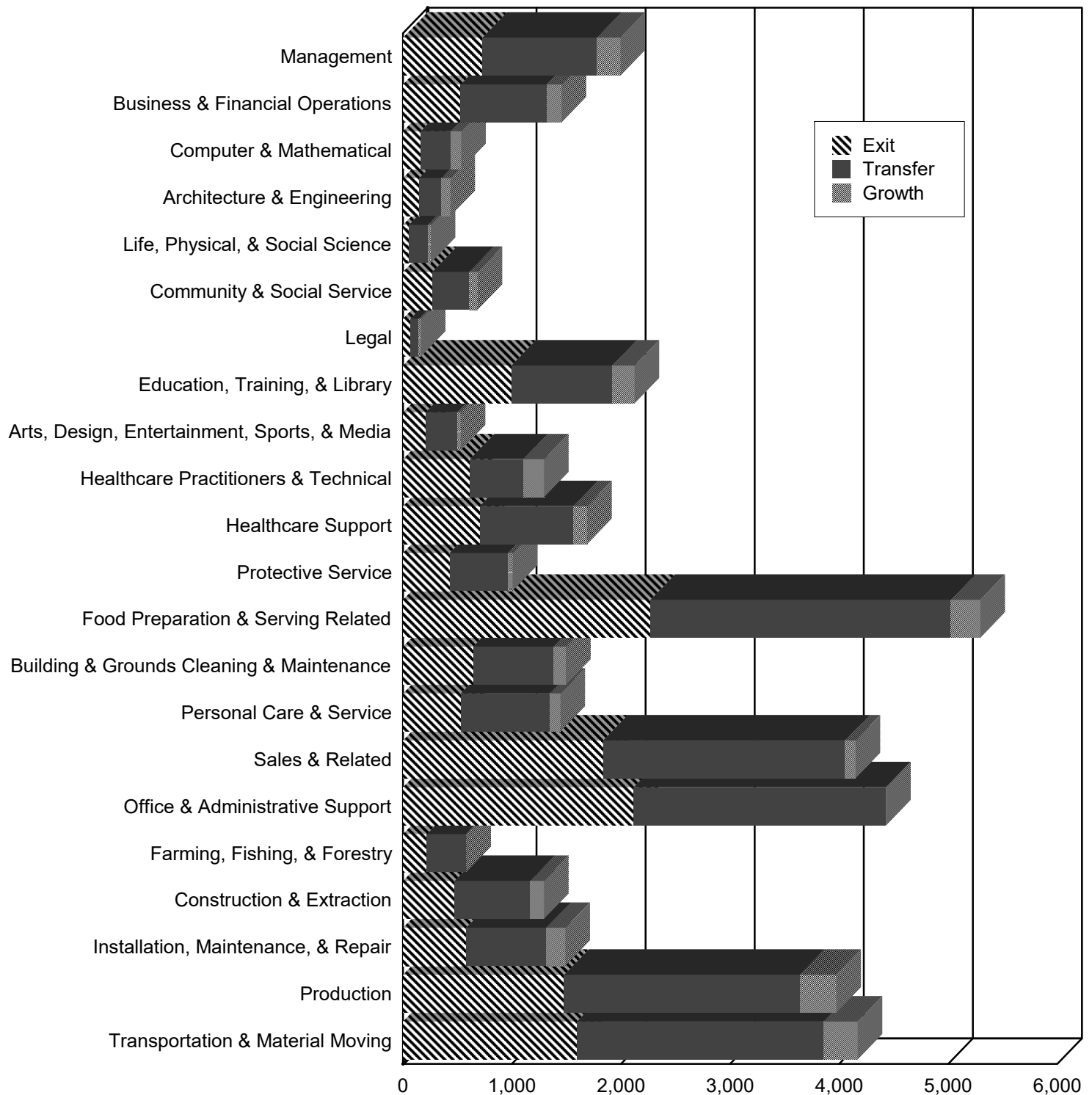

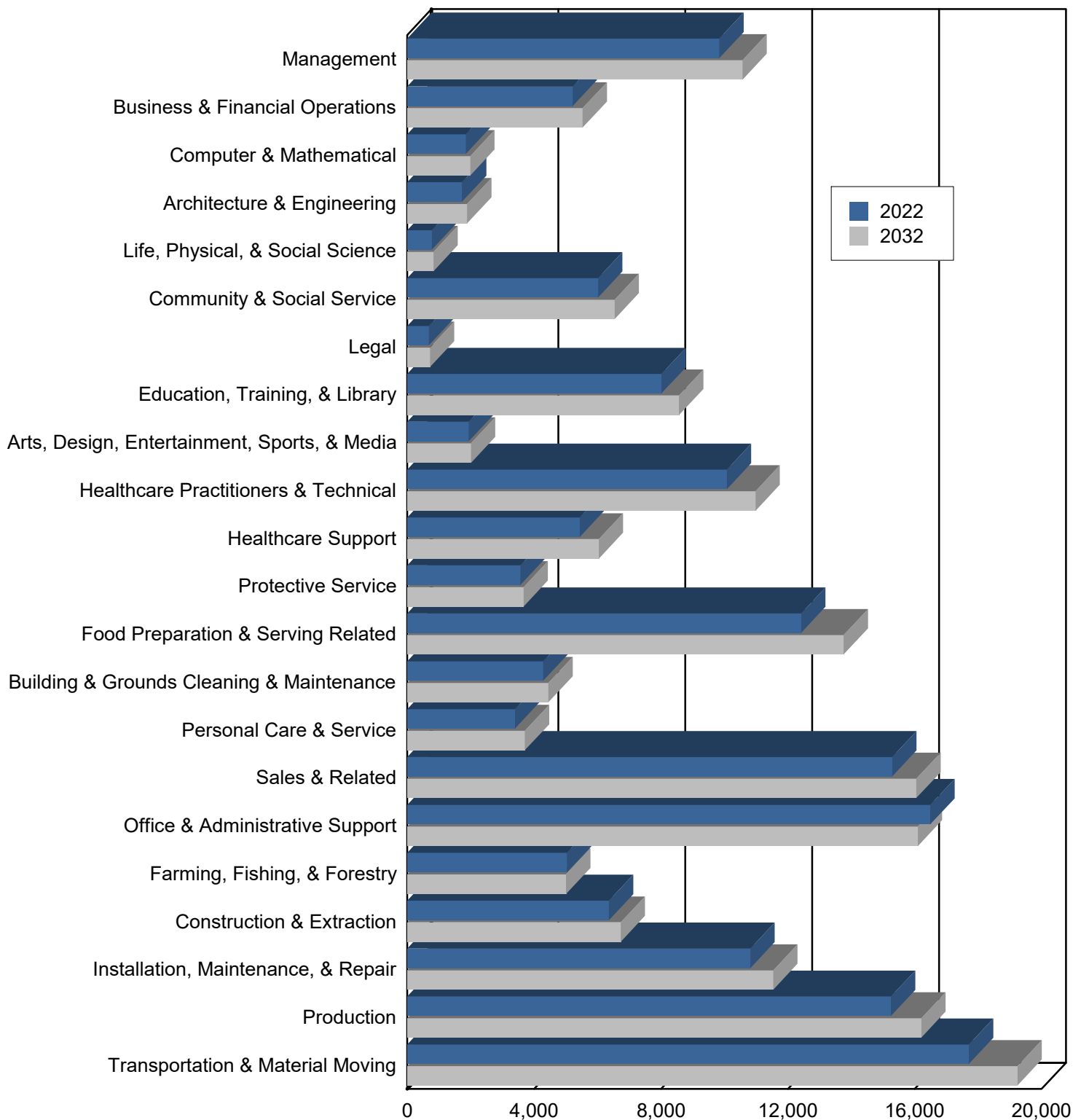

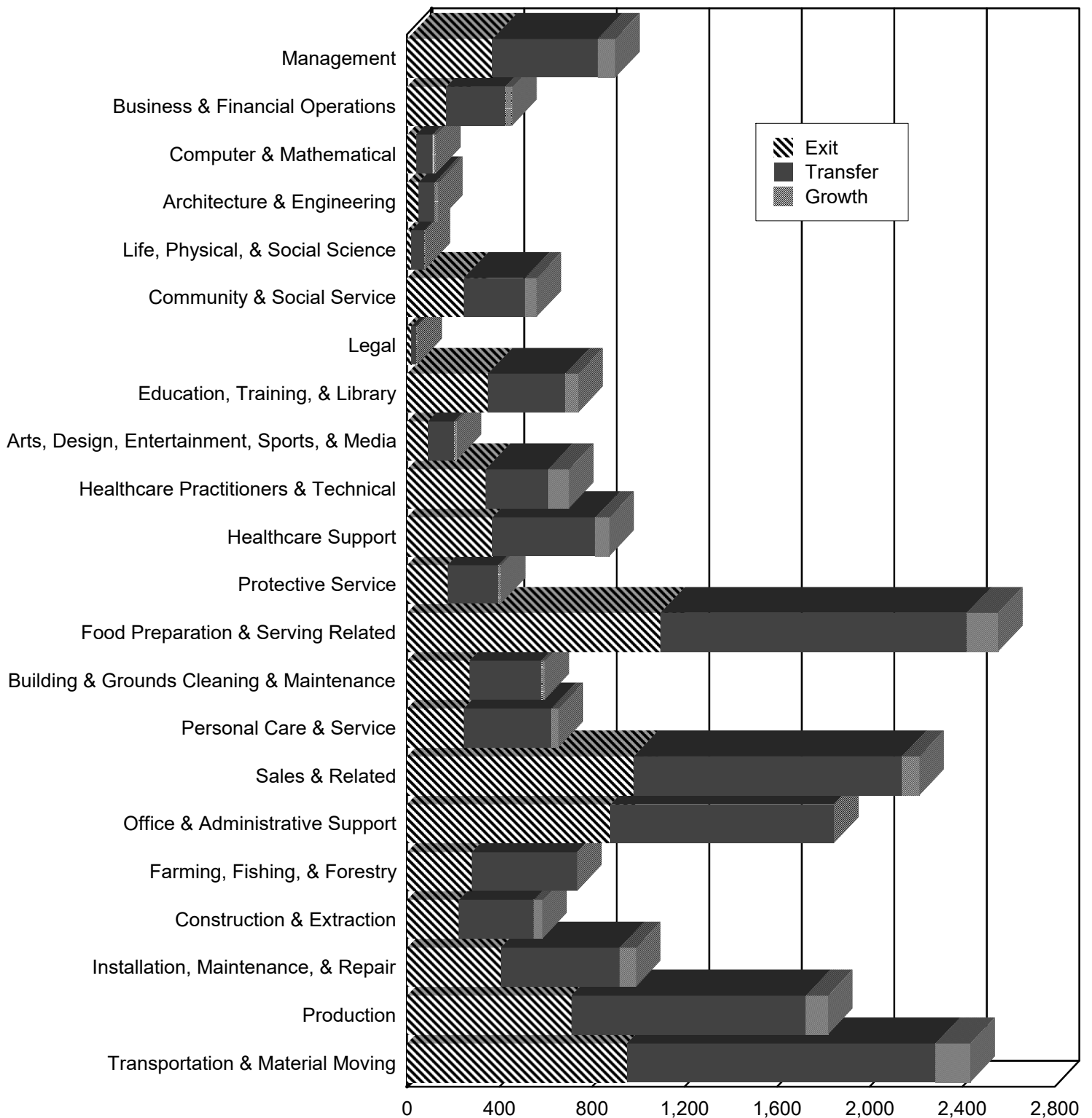
Region 6 Occupational Projections 2022-2032 by Major Occupational Group

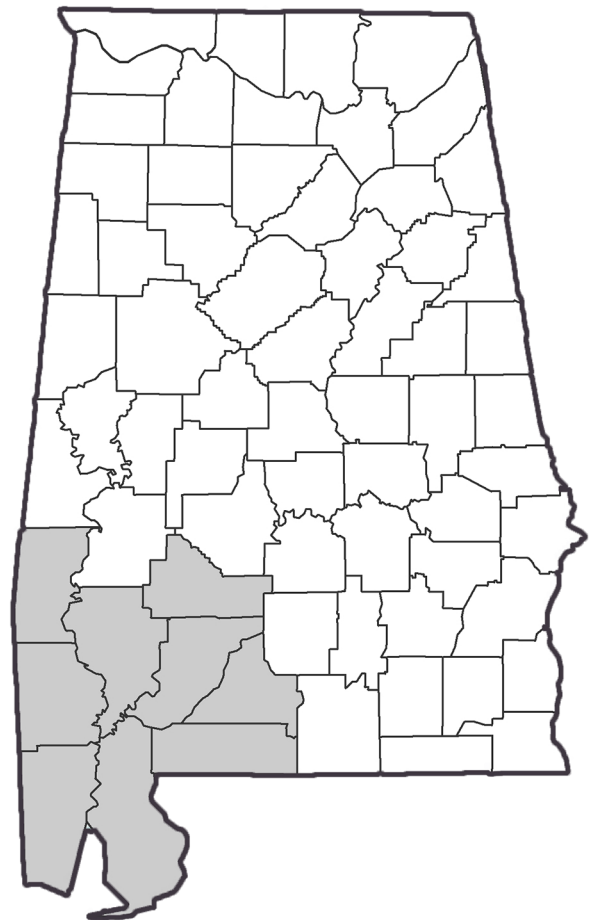

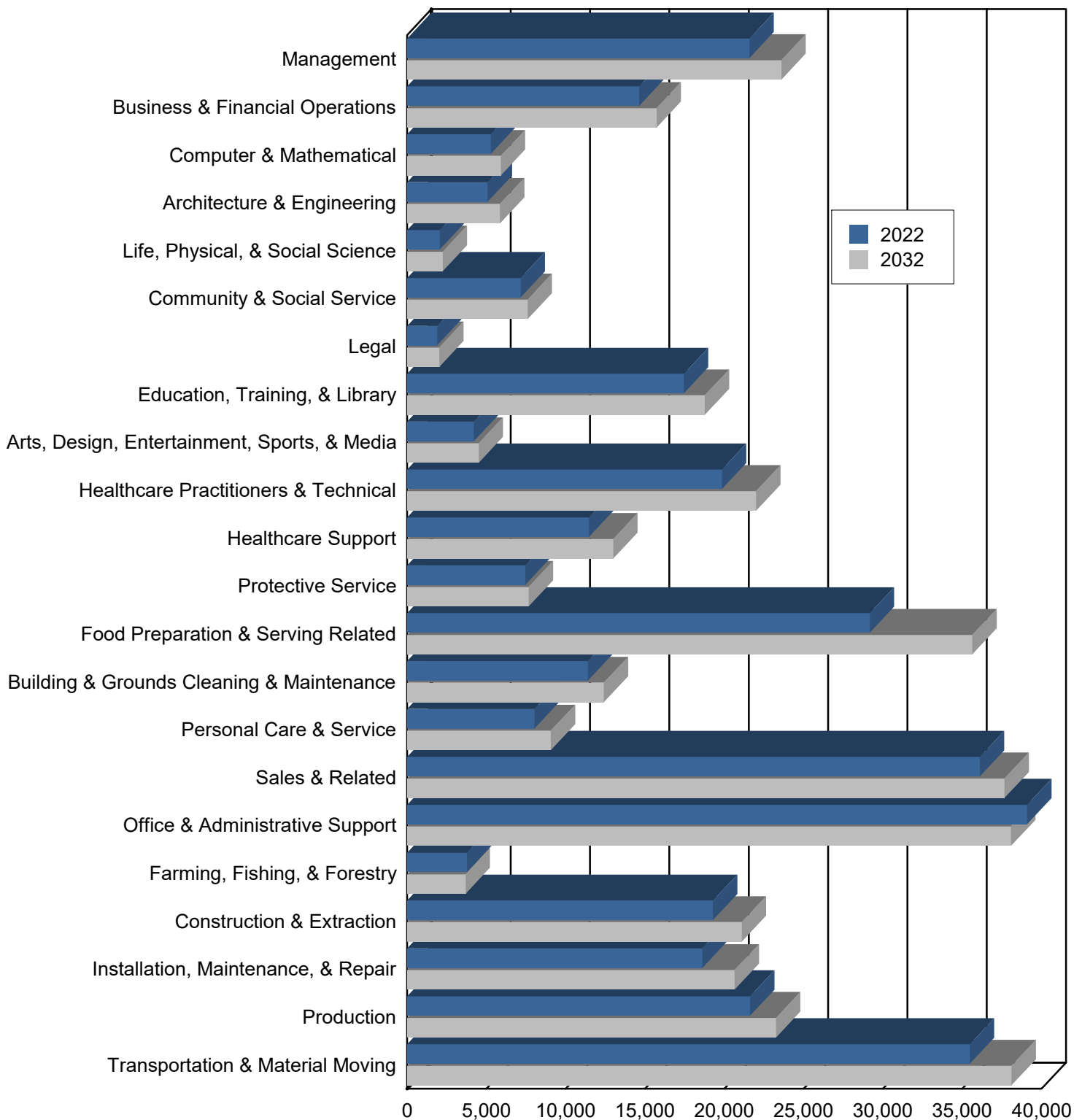

Region 7 Occupational Projections 2022-2032 by Major Occupational Group

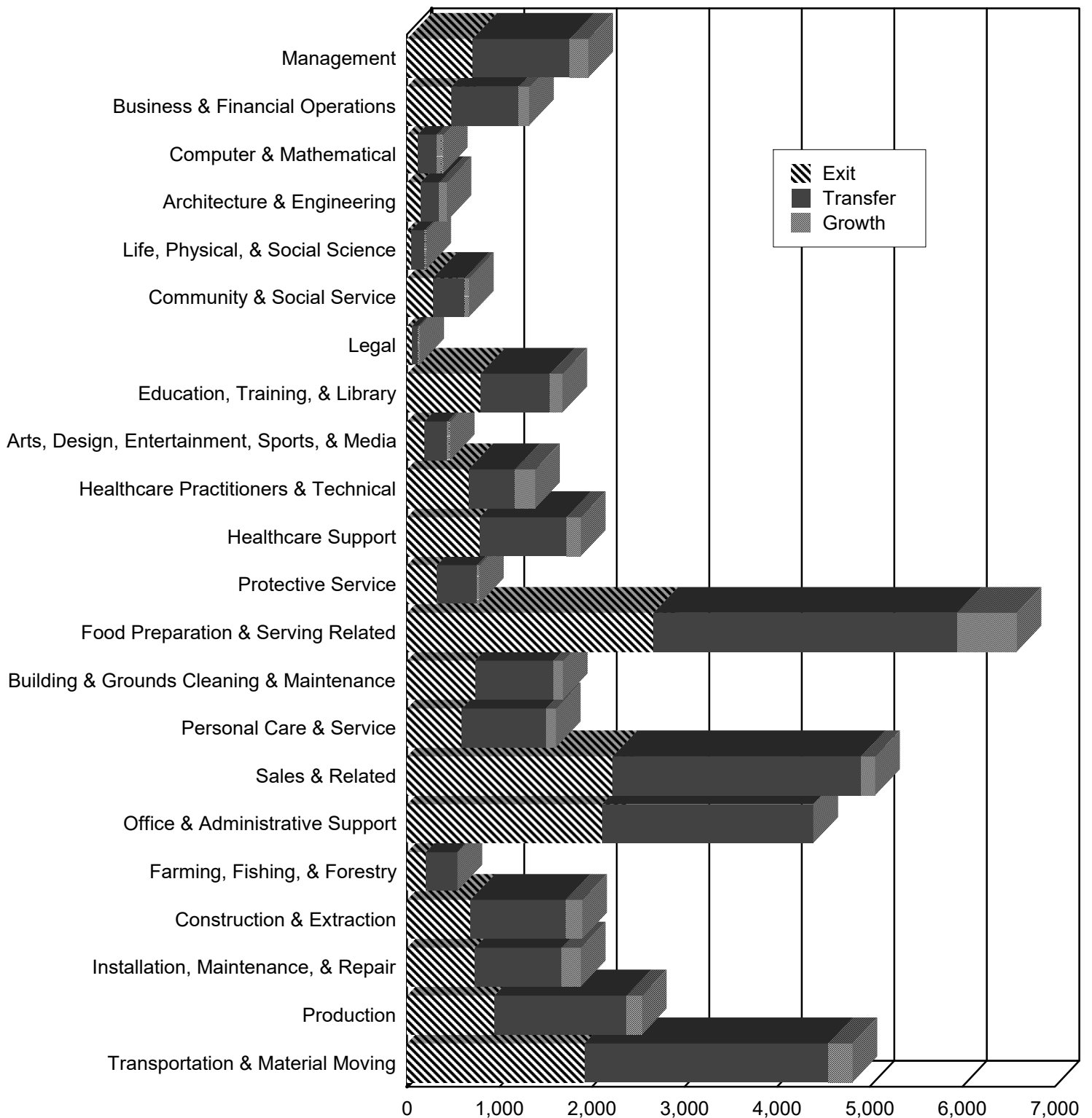

Methodology

The 2022 to 2032 projections of occupational employment presented here were prepared utilizing a matrix industry/occupational concept as introduced in Tomorrow's Manpower Needs, BLS Bulletin 1606 and its supplements. Four general steps were followed:

- (1) Collection and estimation of occupational staffing patterns by industry
- (2) Development of projections of wage and salary employment by industry
- (3) Matrix development of matching occupational staffing patterns to the projected industry growth (or decline)
- (4) Calculation of estimates of replacement requirements by occupation.

The matrix system operates under a microcomputer-based software system developed and technically supported by the Utah Occupational Projections Service Center, Utah Department of Employment Security under contract with the United States Department of Labor. However, the selection of the final methodology and responsibility for the validity of the projections rests with the Alabama Department of Workforce.

Occupational employment data was checked for confidentiality utilizing a BLS developed program, which screens Occupational Employment Statistics program occupational summary estimates through a set of rejection criteria. Occupations, which fail to meet the criteria, were flagged for suppression in the employment fields, but the remaining information is provided; however, published data for summary level occupations do reflect employment for suppressed occupations.

Collection Activities

The OES program generates occupational estimates on an industry-by-industry basis to determine job needs for occupational guidance and training purposes. Employers who have been randomly selected and stratified by industry and size provide occupational classification from a listing of detailed job descriptions. Nonagricultural employment is collected and estimated over a three-year cycle by state employment security agencies. Periodic publications of occupational estimates by industry are released by the Alabama Department of Workforce after each survey is completed and analyzed.

To elicit a high and accurate response, the collection instruments are tailored to the industry's occupational structure. Although each survey questionnaire is limited to a maximum of 225 occupations, total employment is collected in each industry. Data on small or unusual occupations are collected in appropriate residual categories, such as "Engineers, all other" and "Extraction workers, all other."

More than 800 specific occupations have been collected for approximately 400 detailed industries. The industries are categorized by the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) Manual at the three- and four-digit industry level. The sample is drawn from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW), an employment report of the unemployment insurance system. Self-employed, unpaid family, agricultural and domestic workers are not included in the OES Survey. Occupational staffing patterns for these components are derived from 2010 Census data and other reliable sources.

Development of Industrial Projections

Employment levels for each industrial series were developed using time series analysis and are projected to the target year 2032. The final projected matrix is a blend of the occupational structure of each industry applied to the projected industry trend to 2032, as exhibited by historical employment movement at the detailed industry level. The estimates from the various OES surveys are adjusted to total employment for a single, standard reference date – in this case, 2020 OES estimates were used. In this procedure, OES survey estimates are applied to industry controls from the Current Employment Statistics Program. After adjustment to annual average industry data, the survey estimates are processed through a software application that interprets the analysts' decisions to disaggregate the residuals and regroup the data into the matrix format for the base year (2022) for approximately 290 industries and 80 summary level industries.

Matrix Development

To develop cross-industry estimates for each detailed occupation, the occupational content and size must be disaggregated from the residual category. For example, the total number of accountants would be the sum of accountants specifically collected (most industries) plus the accountants estimated in the "all other professional" category in remaining industries. Since the content of the residual categories differs from industry to industry, the estimation of total employment by occupation through simple aggregation of the survey data is not possible. Employment in the residual categories must be partially disaggregated to specific OES survey-based matrix occupations before cross-industry estimates can be tabulated. In the disaggregation process, the residuals are proportioned out using State-specific occupational patterns in the 2010 Census-based matrix.

The final matrix occupation list contains approximately 700 detailed occupations and just over 100 summary level titles distributed among approximately 400 detailed industries based on industrial definitions contained in the 2012 North American Industrial Classification (NAICS) system. The survey occupational titles are arranged into the 2010 Standard Occupational Classification System (SOC). Each occupational title is assigned an SOC code based on this classification system.

Mean vs. Median Wage

The OES program produces mean and percentile, i.e., median, wage estimates by occupation. A mean wage is an average wage, calculated by summing the wages of all the employees in each occupation and then dividing the total wages by the number of employees. A percentile wage is a boundary. The median wage (50th percentile) estimate is the boundary between the highest paid 50 percent and the lowest paid 50 percent of workers in each occupation; meaning, half of workers in a given occupation earn above the median wage and the other half earn less than the median wage.

Occupational Openings Methodology

To measure occupational separations for 2022-2032 projections, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has implemented a new Separations methodology. The Separations methodology was developed to better capture a more accurate picture of the workforce and give BLS the ability to differentiate between workers who are leaving the labor force entirely and those who are changing jobs and leaving an occupation.

Projections are utilized to predict what will happen in the future regarding occupations, and help stakeholders determine what areas of the economy are expected to see growth and decline. Projections help higher education professionals, labor market analysts, and employers determine what occupations will have more openings than others to best train and prepare the workforce.

Workers once entered the labor force at an early age, working until retirement in the same occupation. New, younger workers would replace them once they retired. From technology advancements and trends in the workforce, to policy updates and new standards in human resources, the U.S. labor force is vastly different. These changes in the workforce have brought about the need for a new methodology. Workers today are more likely to be transient and work in several occupations during their lifetime. The Separations methodology accounts for this workforce trend, capturing reasons workers leave an occupation other than retirement, such as changing careers, being promoted into management or completing a retraining program. The new Separations methodology comprehensively and better captures the dynamics of the workforce. As a result, the new methodology will produce more openings in low-skill jobs and jobs that require less than a post-secondary degree. Workers in occupations that require less education are less likely to stay long-term in that occupation since they do not have high levels of occupation-specific skills.

The Separations methodology incorporates past data, patterns, and trends to generate employment projections. Projections from the past methodology should not be compared with projections created using the new Separations methodology. Past projections become outdated when actual employment catches up with them or new projections are released. These are no longer an accurate representation of the workforce.

Rates are the same for all states and will be applied to state-specific occupational staffing patterns. The methodology will account for the distribution of occupations by state, but not state-specific demographics. Since the Separations methodology accounts for the distribution of occupations by states and not demographics, the methodology will not need to be adapted for smaller states.
